- <u>Beyond data: helping renters avoid evictions</u>. Data is at the heart of CREATE Lab's <u>EarthTime</u> visualization tool, and <u>Pittsburgh housing data</u> has been a particular focus for project scientist Anne Wright for the past two years. But then that focus shifted with the onset of the coronavirus pandemic.
- <u>Al outperforms humans in speech recognition</u>. Alex Waibel, who holds faculty appointments in both the Language Technologies Institute and at the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology (KIT) in Germany, reports that his German lab has developed a computer system that for the first time outperforms people in recognizing conversational speech.
- SCS students are organizing and piloting a new, student-led <u>Graduate Application Support Program</u>. The program is designed to give applicants feedback before they formally submit their application, especially for applicants who have fewer resources available to them or come from traditionally underrepresented backgrounds. While the time commitment varies, the anticipated time requirement is around a few hours during the first two weeks of November.
