A YEAR TO REMEMBER. A YEAR WE WON'T FORGET.

Today is the <u>Day of Enlightenment</u>, marking one year since George Floyd was killed by a police officer in Minneapolis. The reflection on this tragedy, which led to protests across the country and around the world, represented the first time most people in America began to look critically at racial and social justice issues.

One year later, people will gather today not only to honor George Floyd's life but to commit to the work of healing the divisions and inequities in our society caused by hate and racism. While George Floyd's loved ones visit with President Biden at the White House today and legislation for police reform begins to take shape in Congress, our work of recognizing injustice and striving for accountability continues.

CMU's Vice Provost for <u>Diversity</u>, <u>Equity and Inclusion</u>, Wanda Heading-Grant, invites the CMU community to <u>connect virtually at 4 p.m. EDT today for nine minutes and 29 seconds of collective silent reflection</u> and remembrance as we further resolve to address racism and promote justice, equity, diversity and inclusion at CMU and beyond. <u>President Farnam Jahanian shared a statement</u> earlier today.

At CMU and in SCS, we know that we have much work to do – and to keep doing. SCS Associate Dean for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Jodi Forlizzi and I encourage everyone in SCS to take time to reflect and participate in events or programs today and during this week.
